Just after our last newsletter, SFP rolled out new online resources

— the Introduction to Aquaculture Improvement Projects (AIP) and the Aquaculture Improvement Project (AIP) Toolkit to support new AIPs and accelerate the adoption of better management practices across aquaculture industries.

The new AIP Toolkit provides stepby-step guidance on how to initiate, implement, and report an AIP, and ultimately improve aquaculture policy and management strategies that result in improvements on the water.



Sustainable Seafood Data Tool

The <u>Sustainable Seafood Data</u>

<u>Tool</u> is designed to offer users a clearer picture of environmental and social performance for global seafood production, along with a more detailed look at eight priority seafood sectors.

The Seafood Certification & Ratings Collaboration, a collective group of five NGOs—The Monterey Bay Aquarium Seafood Watch Program, SFP, the Aquaculture Stewardship Council, the Marine Stewardship Council, and Fair Trade USA, worked together to produce the tool, which includes sustainability-related data from all five NGOs.
